

Skirball Museum-Hebrew Union College --

The Skirball features an extraordinary museum, changing exhibitions, engaging music, theater, comedy, film, family, and literary programs, Zeidler's Café, and Audrey's Museum store—all in a stunning architectural setting designed by renowned architect Moshe Safdie.

Kentucky Military History Museum --

The Kentucky Military History Museum emphasizes the service of the Kentucky Militia, State Guard, and other volunteer military organizations, from the Revolution through the Gulf War. Displays include an impressive collection of firearms, edged weapons, artillery, uniforms, flags, photographs, personal items, and other equipment that illustrates the Commonwealth's martial heritage. The KMHM is operated by the Kentucky National Guard and the Kentucky Historical Society.

Headley-Whitney Museum --

The Headley-Whitney Museum devotes itself to the education and appreciation of the decorative arts. It strives to include the entire community through a wide variety of exhibitions and educational programs designed to appeal to people of all ages and backgrounds

Aviation Museum of Kentucky --

This museum includes 12,000 square feet of exhibit space, a library, and an aircraft restoration and repair shop. Historic airplanes, photos, documents and training equipment are all included in the museum's permanent collection. A great number of the items from the museum's original displays were donated from the personal collections of members of the Kentucky Aviation History Roundtable. The Roundtable is a local group of aviation enthusiasts, founded in 1978, who first came up with the idea of a permanent aviation museum at the Blue Grass Airport. As a part of its collection, the museum displays both military and civilian aircraft. Detailing aviation history, the museum houses aircraft ranging from restored barnstormers and vintage airliners, to historic warbirds and flyable aircraft from today.

The museum is the "Showplace for Saddlebreds". Located on the grounds of the beautiful Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, KY, the American Saddlebred Museum is an exciting destination. Inside, visitors learn the important role the ASB played in our nation's history, and how he has evolved into the beautiful and versatile breed we know today. The Museum features special exhibits that change each year as well as our permanent exhibit and award-winning theater show. The American Saddlebred Museum houses the largest collection of Saddlebred artifacts in the world. In our archives can be found trophies, photographs, tack, and artwork, including one of the most extensive collections of George Ford Morris Saddlebred paintings in existence. Our library contains over 2,400 volumes used by our members for bloodline and geneological

research. The Museum serves as a resource to the Saddlebred industry while educating visitors about the beauty, versatility, and history of the American Saddlebred horse

Hunt-Morgan House --
201 N. Mill Street, Lexington, KY
In the midst of Lexington's historic antebellum Gratz Park, the Hunt-Morgan House stands as a reminder of early 19th century life, when Lexington was known as The Athens of the West. The museum's collection of early Kentucky furniture, antique porcelain and 19th century paintings captures the elegance of the Hunt and Morgan families. The rooms are furnished with articles of the period as well as those owned by the family. The Alexander T. Hunt Civil War Museum, located on the second floor of the Hunt-Morgan House, features an extensive collection of Civil War relics and memorabilia.

American Printing House for the Blind Callahan Museum --

Established in 1969, the Ohio County Historical Society opened its museum in 1972. Displays focus on the 1800's and early 20th century life and events. The best known item in the collection is the racing boat, HOOSIER BOY, famous raceboat of the early 1900's. The boat holds the record between Cincinnati and Louisville, round trip, at 60 mph. It was designed, built and raced by J. W. Whitlock of Rising Sun. On October 5, 2003, the HOOSIER GIRL, the sister boat to the HOOSIER BOY, came home. The HOOSIER GIRL was built in the 1940s after the first one (built 1908) sunk in the early 1940s. She is an exact duplicate of the original boat.

National Underground Railroad Freedom Center --

The National Underground Railroad Freedom Center stands as the nation's newest monument to freedom. It brings to life the importance and relevance of struggles for freedom around the world and throughout history, including today. Made up of

three buildings that symbolize the cornerstones of freedom (courage, cooperation, & perseverance), the Freedom Center's curving architecture reflects the winding river and the often-changing path to freedom. Group rates available for groups of 10 or more who schedule their visit at least two weeks in advance. Group rates are \$9.50 (Adults), \$8.00 (Seniors), & \$6.50 (Children). Group tour hours are Tue-Sat, 10am - 3:30pm & Sun 11am-3:30pm.
